



Decoupage

Decoupage is one of the easiest crafts to do. It always turns out nicely. We can take a favorite picture, or a Bible verse, or a family picture, and place it on a wooden plaque. A plaque is a small board. We can hang our finished plaque on a wall, or give it as a gift.

What You Will Need

Your teacher will be able to help you collect your supplies.

Learning to Decoupage


- 1. Sand your plaque until it is smooth. Wipe it clean with a damp cloth.
- 2. Stain or paint your plaque.
- 3. Cut out your print. Follow instructions on how to glue your print. Allow to dry overnight.

Embroidery



"And thou shalt embroider the coat of fine linen, and thou shalt make the mitre of fine linen, and thou shalt make the girdle of needlework." —Exodus 28:39. Embroidery is the skill of making designs with a needle and thread. God used women throughout the Bible to do needlework for Him.

What You Will Need

Embroidery hoop, needles, floss, and scissors. Your teacher will help you gather your supplies.

Learning to Stitch

Your teacher will help you learn the following stitches.

★ Running Stitch

Pass the needle over and under the fabric. The stitches on top of the fabric should be of equal length. The lower stitches under the fabric should be of equal length. The lower stitches should be one-half the length of the upper stitches.

★ Satin Stitch


Work straight stitches across a shape. Be sure and keep a neat edge to the shape. Also, do not make your stitches too long. They could separate over time.


\star Cross Stitch

Bring the needle up on the lower right line of the cross. Insert the needle at the top of the same line. Make a stitch through the fabric to the lower left line. Do the whole row this way. Then work

the whole row back the other way finishing all the crosses. It is important that all the top stitches lean the same way.

Mosaics

A mosaic is one big picture made up of many small pieces. The small pieces can be paper, pebbles, or tiny beads. All these little pieces come together to make a pretty picture or design.

What You Will Need


- 1. Pattern You could use a simple picture from a coloring book (for example, a butterfly, a ladybug, or a flower).
- 2. Scissors and glue stick.
- 3. Mosaic pieces Cut small pieces from construction paper or other colored paper. Use several colors.

How to Make a Mosaic

Glue your mosaic pieces onto your pattern. Use different colors to fill in each space. When you are finished, you can cut the shape out. You can glue a magnet on the back and put it on the refrigerator. You can punch a hole through the top and tie a string through it. Then you could hang it up. Or you could frame it.

Things to Learn

Make one mosaic project.



Basic Skills

Painting

Painting is just another way of coloring. You use a brush and paints instead of crayons or pencils. Paints can also be used on wood. Most people like to add color to the things they make. With paint we can mix colors to make new colors. There is no end of colors! It is fun to paint.

What You Will Need


A paint set, paint brushes, heavy paper, and a wooden model or wooden object.

Basic Skills

Plastic Canvas



With some plastic canvas and yarn, we can make magnets, picture frames, and decorations. Needlepoint stitches are used for plastic canvas.

What You Will Need

Patterns, plastic canvas, yarn, needles, and scissors.

Stitches to Learn

★ Continental Stitch — This is the most common plastic canvas stitch.

Diagram 1 — Working from right to left, come up at A. Cross the intersection of the canvas threads diagonally. Go down at B. Come up at C. Go down at D. Continue in this way.






Diagram 2 — Begin the next row by coming up at I. Go down at J. Continue in this way. Always cross canvas thread intersections diagonally on the front and back.



★ Overcast Stitch — When two pieces of your project are ready to be joined, use the overcast stitch. To join two straight edges together, place the pieces with the wrong sides facing each other together. Anchor the yarn firmly on the wrong side. You can use a knot when joining. Start by taking two stitches through the first hole of the two pieces. Then continue overcasting, going through holes of both pieces with each stitch. You can work from either direction. The overcast stitch is also used to finish the edges on a single piece.

Things to Learn

- 1. Show how to do the following stitches.
 - Continental Stitch Horizontal
 - Overcast Stitch
- 2. Complete two small projects such as magnets or key chains.



Basic Skills

Quilling

Quilling is easier than it looks! Quilling is the art of creating designs with narrow strips of paper that are rolled and shaped. The shapes may look like circles or leaves. They can be put together to look like flowers or snowflakes or just about anything.

What You Will Need

Your teacher will provide all the supplies you need.

Helpful Information

Keep your hands and tools clean while you work.

Shapes to Learn


Each design will use three to four inches of quilling paper.

Tight Circle — Roll the paper. Slip the tool from the roll's center. Hold the roll with your fingers to keep it from unwinding. Glue the loose end of the paper to the side of the roll.

Loose Circle — Roll the paper. Remove the tool. Let the roll loosen. Glue the loose end.

Teardrop — Roll the paper. Glue a loose circle. Pinch one side of the circle to a point.

Marquise — Roll the paper. Glue a loose circle. Pinch it on each side.









Basic Skills

Shaped Marquise — Make a marquise. Curl its two pinched points in opposite directions.

Square — Make a marquise. Pinch it two more times to make four corners.



Rubber Stamping



Rubber Stamping is the art of using a rubber stamp to make a picture on paper and coloring it. It sounds simple and it is! One can use rubber stamps to make greeting cards or decorate photo albums. Colored markers or colored pencils can be used to color the stamped images. There are hundreds of stamps

available. It is fun to collect them!

We can stamp beautiful images and designs on paper. Will we let Jesus stamp His image on our hearts?

What You Will Need

Rubber stamps, paper, stamp pads, and coloring pencils or markers.

Learning to Rubber Stamp


With a stamp pad —

- 1. Place your stamp on the stamp pad and press down firmly. Be sure to coat the entire stamp evenly. You can tap the stamp several times on the pad.
- 2. Place the inked stamp onto the paper and press down evenly. Do not rock the stamp back and forth. Rocking could cause blurring.
- 3. It is best to re-ink the stamp before each stamping.
- 4. Use colored pencils or brush markers to color your stamping.
- 5. On a greeting card, you can add words with markers or a pen.
- 6. You can add glitter or stickers, or anything you would like, to make your card look special.

Simple Sewing





Mom's Reference for Skills

Following are some helpful hints for teaching skills to children.

When teaching the little ones hand skills, do not look for perfection. These are all new physical exercises for them, and their little fingers will be awkward. The important thing is learning, trying, and completing. Neat little stitches or neatly drawn pictures will come later. Practice makes perfect, as the saying goes. For now we want the girls to try lots of new things, and feel good about what they are doing. This will encourage them to keep an open mind, and to try more and more things.

Never compare one child's efforts with another child's. Each is unique. Just be sure each child is doing her best. Be sure to be lavish in your praise and encouragement.

Godly Girlhood

Bible Memory

Each memory work, when completed, should be recited word-perfect or nearly perfect to a mom or teacher. Only one memory work per year is needful, but we hope the girls will learn more than one. We can never memorize too much of God's Word.

Choose from the listed selections. You are also free to memorize any other portions of Scripture not listed. An award which simply states "Bible Memory" is also available, and there are many other Bible Memory awards available through Keepsake Awards on Amazon.

Notes for Mothers and Teachers

Bible Reading

Because the children are so young, the children can receive a Bible Reading award if an adult reads the passages out loud to them.

Manners

Most of the information for the knowledge needed to learn this skill can be found in a book on etiquette available from your local library.

Basic Skills

Croquet

- 1. The order of play—or who goes first, second, and so on—is determined by the colors on the stake.
- 2. A game usually lasts for one to two hours. However, it can be ended at any time, and the winner is declared by adding up the points. One point is given for each wicket through which a player's ball has passed.

Decoupage

Supplies

- 1. Print A scenic picture, a Bible verse, or a nice design from a greeting card.
- 2. Wooden Plaque
- 3. Brush A soft flat one-inch brush or a sponge brush for applying the glue or special finish.
- 4. Scissors Used to cut print to correct size for plaque.
- 5. Waxed Paper Protects work surface.
- 6. Stain or Paint Used for a base coat on plaque.
- 7. #220 Sandpaper This is very fine sandpaper and will be used to smooth the surface of the plaque.
- 8. Decoupage Finish Two brand names which are available from craft stores are ModgePodge and Royal Coat.

Instructions for Decoupage

- 1. Sand plaque until it is smooth. Next, wipe plaque clean with a damp cloth.
- 2. Stain or paint plaque.
- 3. Cut print to fit on plaque. Use the decoupage finish on the back side of the print as a type of glue. Place your glued print on the plaque. Using your fingers, press firmly, working from the center of the print to the outer edges. Be sure to press out any air bubbles. Once the print is in place with no air bubbles, brush the decoupage finish over the entire surface of the project. Allow to dry for at least twenty minutes. Repeat this process two more times. Allow to dry overnight.

Embroidery

Supplies

- 1. Tools Embroidery hoop and scissors will be needed.
- Embroidery Needles These are needles designed for embroidery work. They have long eyes—the hole in the end of the needle is called the eye of the needle—for easy threading, and they are very sharp. A sharp point will pierce fabric more easily than a dull needle.

Needles come in different sizes. A size 9 or 10 is a good size for a beginner.

- 3. Embroidery Thread Embroidery thread is called floss. It comes with six threads or strands. Pull out a length of thread about 18 inches and cut it. Then pull out two strands. You will thread your needle with this section.
- Fabrics Almost anything can furnish a fabric to embroider: handkerchief, bib, a blouse. You can also embroider a picture. Pictures are sometimes called "samplers."
- 5. Pattern Patterns can be purchased.

Projects

A project could be a handkerchief, a towel, or a small sampler that can be framed. The project does not need to contain the stitches taught in the embroidery section.

Plastic Canvas

Supplies

- 1. Pattern Patterns usually come from a book on plastic canvas.
- 2. Canvas Plastic canvas comes in clear or colored sheets.
- Yarn Choose a yarn that is thick enough to cover the canvas. You would not want to use embroidery floss, but a thicker yarn that is used for crocheting or knitting.
- 4. Scissors Three pairs of sharp scissors are needed. A pair of large scissors with straight blades are best for cutting canvas. A pair of 7 inch scissors with sharp points are best for cutting small areas of canvas and trimming off nubs. Keep these scissors for just plastic canvas work because cutting the canvas will dull their blades. An additional pair of 7 inch scissors would be handy for cutting yarn.
- 5. Needles A blunt point steel tapestry needle is best for plastic canvas. For a size 7-mesh canvas, use a size 16 or size 18 needle.

Helpful Information

How to Cut Plastic Canvas

Plastic canvas pieces must be cut carefully. If you miscut, the piece is ruined, and you will have to cut another piece. Cutting will be easier if you draw a cutting outline on the canvas. A China marking pencil works well because it can easily be wiped off after you are finished cutting. How to Begin and End Yarn

Knots are not usually used in canvas work. To begin your stitching, hold an inch of yarn behind the canvas and secure it by working your first several stitches over it. After you have worked an area, end strands by weaving them horizontally or vertically through the stitches on the back of the canvas.

Pressed Flowers

Supplies

- 1. Basket A basket or similar container can be used to gather flowers. Pick only the freshest flowers for drying.
- 2. Flower Identification Book This will be used to identify flowers that your child might not know.
- 3. Scissors Scissors are used to trim the flowers before drying them, and also to cut the blotting paper as needed.
- 4. Flower Press Will be used to press flowers. Presses are available in craft stores or you can make your own.
- 5. Toothpicks Use toothpicks to place small drops of glue on the flowers when gluing them in place.
- 6. Large Tweezers Tweezers are used to pick up flowers and place them on the paper.
- 7. Material for Your Projects After flowers are dried, they can be used for projects such as pictures, bookmarks, picture frames, stationery, or greeting cards. Materials might include paper, glue, ribbon, pens, and picture frames.

Helpful Information

If dried petals or leaves fall off while you are handling them, do not worry! They can be glued back in place when you are making your project.

Quilling

Supplies

- 1. Quilling Paper Quilling paper comes in many different colors and widths. The most common size is 1/8 inch.
- 2. Slotted Tool The slotted tool is used for rolling the paper.
- 3. Ruler A ruler is needed to measure the lengths of quilling paper.
- 4. Glue Glue is needed to hold the ends of the paper together after finishing a roll or gluing two designs together. Any paper glue will do.
- 5. Project Paper This is the paper which is the base for your quilling shapes. If you are making greeting cards, a lightweight cardstock paper will do. If you are going to frame your project, you might want to use cardboard. The cardboard can be covered with any pretty paper.
- 6. Toothpicks These are helpful in placing small dots of glue where you need them.
- 7. Wax Paper This can be used to place under the project while you are working on it. If your design sticks to the paper, carefully loosen it with a toothpick.

Notes for Mothers and Teachers

8. Quilling Project — Projects can be found in quilling books or purchased as kits. Both will give how-to instructions for learning different quilling shapes.

Helpful Information

Keeping your hands and tools clean while you work will help keep your quilling papers clean. Wash hands often.

Rubber Stamping

Supplies

- 1. Rubber Stamps
- 2. Papers Rubber stamping may be done on almost any type of paper, except glossy. Glossy paper requires special inks and often heat guns.
- 3. Stamp Pads These come in many colors. Dye ink pads dry more quickly than pigment ink pads, so they are usually recommended for children.
- 4. Coloring Tools Colored pencils, markers, and fine-point paint pens can all be used to add color to your stampings.

Helpful Information

- 1. Caring for your rubber stamps is easy. Always clean your stamps after using them. You can use a little window cleaner or dish soap to wash them, then rinse and dry them.
- 2. Store your stamps in a clean, dry container.

Learning to Rubber Stamp With a Stamp Pad —

- 1. Demonstrate to the children how to place the stamp on the stamp pad and press down firmly and evenly, coating the entire rubber image. Do not rock the stamp back and forth. That will cause ink to go onto the wooden sides of the stamp. You can also tap the stamp several times on the pad.
- 2. Place the inked stamp onto the surface you are using (paper, cloth, etc.) and press down firmly with an equal amount of pressure. Do not rock the stamp back and forth, because rocking could cause the image to become blurred.
- 3. For best results, re-ink the stamp before each stamping.
- 4. Use colored pencils or brush markers to color your stamping.
- 5. When making a greeting card, you can add a greeting or special words with markers or a pen.
- 6. You can add glitter or stickers, or anything you would like to give your card a special touch.

Scrapbooking

Supplies

- 1. A Scrapbook An 8x8 inch album is a great size to begin scrapbooking.
- 2. Acid-free Adhesives Glue sticks, liquid glue, or double-sided tapes can be used. They must not contain acid.

Notes for Mothers and Teachers

- 3. Acid-free Black Pens Don't use just any pen on your pages. You want to use pens made for scrapbooking. Scrapbooking pens will not bleed through to the other side of the paper, nor will they become blurry over time.
- 4. Templates Templates are patterns for making designs such as circles, ovals, or hearts. You can use these to trace and cut out shapes to frame your photos.
- 5. Plain and Patterned Papers There are many different kinds, colors, and patterns of paper. Be sure to choose acid-free and lignin-free papers.
- 6. Scissors It is nice to mix cuts with both straight-edged scissors and patternededged scissors.

(Acid and lignin free products help scrapbook pages to last longer by not causing yellowing or causing things to become brittle over time.)
